As a lead up to that page, here is a devotion for September 1st, from Henri Nouwen's *You are the Beloved*:

Your Inner Community

Those you have deeply loved become part of you. The longer you live, there will always be more people to be loved by you and to become part of your inner community. The wider your inner community becomes, the more easily you will recognize your own brothers and sisters in the strangers around you...The wider the community of your heart, the wider the community around you.

I think part of Jesus' vision for all of us is that we recognize we are meant for community. Jesus wanted us to identify as a part of one another. Jesus understood that *belonging* and identifying with community gives us life: purpose, compassion, comfort, and strength.

Jesus believed this so much that he often identified his personal identity with our collective identity, that our togetherness is his divine dwelling place (Cf. "For where two or three are gathered in my name, I am there among them" [Mt 18:20]; We are Christ's me [Acts 9:4]; "For in the one Spirit we were all baptized into one body...you are the body of Christ, and individually members of it" [1 Cor. 12:13a, 27]).

According to our Savior there is deep sacredness and divinity to be experienced when we live into connection with one another. Perhaps this Wednesday Night Adult Devotional time can be such a connection for you.

In any case, I so look forward to the sacredness of community to be experienced in all kinds of places this upcoming programmatic year.




The time for voices singing in praise has come!




Grieving with Hope by Samuel Hodges

This book is packed with short, biblically based, gospel-centered, topical chapters addressing the issues grieving people face but are often hesitant to mention to others. It helps readers accurately interpret the message their emotions are sending them and gently guides them to determine whether they're grieving in a way that leads to hope and ultimate healing. *Grieving with Hope* helps the bereaved discover how hope and peace are available amidst their heartache and pain.




The Girl Who Sang to the Buffalo by Kent Nerburn

Part history, part mystery, part spiritual journey and teaching story, *The Girl Who Sang to the Buffalo* is filled with the profound insight into humanity and Native American culture we have come to expect from Nerburn's journeys. As the American Indian College Fund has stated, once you have encountered Nerburn's stirring evocations of America's high plains and incisive insights into the human heart, you can never look at the world, or at people, the same way again."




American Indian Liberation by George Tinker

In this book, "Tink" Tinker focuses in particular on differing understandings of Jesus Christ and of the land, and the centrality of both to the "theology of sovreignity" and the challenges communities of faith face, particularly indigenous communities, in a postcolonial world.



An Indigenous Peoples' History of the United States by Roxanne Dunbar-Ortiz

An Indigenous Peoples' History of the United States is an essential resource providing historical threads that are crucial for understanding the present. In An Indigenous Peoples' History of the United States, Dunbar-Ortiz adroitly challenges the founding myth of the United States and shows how policy against the Indigenous peoples was colonialist and designed to seize the territories of the original inhabitants, displacing or eliminating them. And as Dunbar-Ortiz reveals, this policy was praised in popular culture, through writers like James Fenimore Cooper and Walt Whitman, and in the highest offices of government and the military. Shockingly, as the genocidal policy reached its zenith under President Andrew Jackson, its ruthlessness was best articulated by US Army general Thomas S. Jesup, who, in 1836, wrote of the Seminoles: "The country can be rid of them only by exterminating them."



The Manitous by Basil Johnston

Manitous lived in human form among the Ojibway in the early days, after Kitchi-Manitou (the Great Mystery) created all things and Muzzu-Kummik-Quae (Mother Earth) revealed the natural order of the world. With depth and humor, Johnston tells how lasting tradition was brought to the Ojibway by four half-human brothers, including Nana'b'oozoo, the beloved archetypal being who means well but often blunders. He also relates how people are helped and hindered by other entities, such as the manitous of the forests and meadows, personal manitous and totems, mermen and merwomen, Pauguk (the cursed Flying Skeleton), and the Weendigoes, famed and terrifying giant cannibals.

Stringing Rosaries by Denise Lajimodiere




Denise Lajimodiere's interest in American Indian boarding school survivors stories evolved from recording her father and other family members speaking of their experiences. Her research helped her to gain insight, a deeper understanding of her parents, and how and why she and her siblings were parented in the way they were. That insight led her to an emotional ceremony of forgiveness, described in the last chapter of *Stringing Rosaries*.

The journey to record survivors stories led her through the Dakotas and Minnesota and into the personal and private space of boarding school survivors. While there, she heard stories that they had never shared before. She came to an understanding of new terms: historical and intergenerational trauma, soul wound.

Stringing Rosaries presents a brief history of the boarding school programs for Indigenous Americans, followed by sixteen interviews with boarding school survivors, and ending with the author's own healing journey with her father.

Neither Wolf Nor Dog by Kent Nerburn




Against an unflinching backdrop of 1990s reservation life and the majestic spaces of the western Dakotas, *Neither Wolf nor Dog* tells the story of two men, one white and one Indian, locked in their own understandings yet struggling to find a common voice. In this award-winning book, acclaimed author Kent Nerburn draws us deep into the world of a Native American elder named Dan, who leads Kent through Indian towns and down forgotten roads that swirl with the memories of the Ghost Dance and Sitting Bull. Along the way we meet a vivid cast of characters — ranging from Jumbo, a 400-pound mechanic, to Annie, an eighty-year-old Lakota woman living in a log cabin with no running water. An unlikely cross between *On the Road* and *Black Elk Speaks*, *Neither Wolf nor Dog* takes us past the myths and stereotypes of the Native American experience, revealing an America few ever see.




Just Mercy by Bryan Stevenson

Bryan Stevenson was a young lawyer when he founded the Equal Justice Initiative, a legal practice dedicated to defending those most desperate and in need: the poor, the wrongly condemned, and women and children trapped in the farthest reaches of our criminal justice system. One of his first cases was that of Walter McMillian, a young man who was sentenced to die for a notorious murder he insisted he didn't commit. The case drew Bryan into a tangle of conspiracy, political machination, and legal brinksmanship—and transformed his understanding of mercy and justice forever.



White Earth Tragedy – Ethnicity and Dispossession at a Minnesota Anishinabe Reservation by Melissa Meyer


This compelling interdisciplinary history of an Anishinaabe community at the White Earth Reservation in Minnesota offers a subtle and sophisticated look at changing social, economic, and political relations among the Anishinaabeg and reveals how cultural forces outside of the reservation profoundly affected their lives.



The Nones by Ryan Burge

The growth of the nones in American society has been dramatic. In 1972, just 5 percent of Americans claimed "no religion" on the General Social Survey. In 2018, that number rose to 23.7 percent, making the nones as numerous as both evangelical Protestants and Roman Catholics. Every indication is that the nones will be the largest religious group in the United States in the next decade. *The Nones* gives readers a nuanced, accurate, and meaningful picture of the growing number of Americans who say that they have no religious affiliation. Burge explains how this rise happened, who the nones are, and what they mean for the future of American religion.


Sacred Ground by Eboo Patel



There is no better time to stand up for your values than when they are under attack. Alarmist, hateful rhetoric once relegated to the fringes of political discourse has now become frighteningly mainstream, with pundits and politicians routinely invoking the specter of Islam as a menacing, deeply anti-American force.

In Sacred Ground, author and renowned interfaith leader Eboo Patel says this prejudice is not just a problem for Muslims but a challenge to the very idea of America. Patel shows us that Americans from George Washington to Martin Luther King Jr. have been "interfaith leaders," illustrating how the forces of pluralism in America have time and again defeated the forces of prejudice. Patel offers a primer in the art and science of interfaith work, bringing to life the growing body of research on how faith can be a bridge of cooperation rather than a barrier of division and sharing stories from the frontlines of interfaith activism.

Patel asks us to share in his vision of a better America—a robustly pluralistic country in which our commonalities are more important than our differences, and in which difference enriches, rather than threatens, our religious traditions. Pluralism, Patel boldly argues, is at the heart of the American project, and this visionary book will inspire Americans of all faiths to make this country a place where diverse traditions can thrive side by side.



The Wolf at Twilight – An Elders Journey through a Land of Ghosts and Shadows by Kent Nerburn

A note is left on a car windshield, an old dog dies, and Kent Nerburn finds himself back on the Lakota reservation where he traveled more than a decade before with a tribal elder named Dan. The touching, funny, and haunting journey that ensues goes deep into reservation boardingschool mysteries, the dark confines of sweat lodges, and isolated Native homesteads far back in the Dakota hills in search of ghosts that have haunted Dan since childhood.

In this fictionalized account of actual events, Nerburn brings the land of the northern High Plains alive and reveals the Native American way of teaching and learning with a depth that few outsiders have ever captured.

Angels

I am the Lord, I have called you in righteousness, I will also hold you by the hand and watch over you. Isaiah 42:6

See that you do not despise one of these little ones, for I say to you that their angels in heaven continually see the face of My Father who is in heaven. Matthew 18:10

She fell asleep on the 2-mile trek home from movie night at Papa Jordan's, the culmination of a day bursting with family events. Oaklyn roused enough to get out of the car and into the house under her own power. Her pajamas were donned more by touch than by what little sight penetrated her eyes, which were now narrow slits.

"Prayers, Grandma," the words muffled as they escaped from her exhausted cheeks. She snuggled under the blanket. We said her prayer first, although it was carried mostly by my voice.

Here I lay me down to sleep, I pray the Lord my soul to keep. When in the morning light I wake, show me the path of love to take. Amen

Then came the Lord's Prayer, which Oaklyn usually refers to as "Grandma's" prayer. With her eyes closed, her voice joined in, surprisingly gaining power. Then, in her daze of sleepiness, "Grandma, can we do the short one?" She meant her prayer, her dreamy head not conscious enough to remember the first time around, so she joined me as we prayed it a second time, its words enfolding her in the comfort of God's love.

Children's prayers can offer the protections of angels, or the promise of God's presence with or love for them during the dark night. As we grow in our relationship with God, our prayers also grow to include gratitude, entreaties for others, and requests for God to increase our understanding of His word and His path for our lives. Sometimes adults (including me) can be carried off to sleep trusting in God's comfort, love, and peace in children's prayers.

Fix It Forward Ministry is a 501(c)(3) not-for-profit charity. It is in partnership with Fix It Forward Auto Care and its four Fargo-Moorhead-West Fargo locations. The goal of Fix It Forward Ministry is to remove the transportation barrier for the most in-need members of the community, thus helping enable them to be independent and self-sufficient. This is accomplished in two ways:

- by providing free car repairs to needy individuals to help keep their vehicles on the road and safe
- by repairing donated vehicles and giving them to needy members in the community who do not have a vehicle or whose vehicle is beyond repair

Fix It Forward Auto Care provides the shop space, equipment, and resources for Fix It Forward Ministry volunteer teams to work after business hours and on weekends. Volunteer labor is utilized along with discounted parts and charitable donations to cover the cost of repairs. It's interesting to note that every Fix It Forward Auto Care team member in all four locations is involved in the Ministry.

Nearly 500 vehicles have been gifted since 2018! Well over 1000 vehicles have been repaired.

This Ministry is truly Driven to Serve both the in-need and our Lord.


WEDNESDAY NIGHT ADULT DEVOTIONAL

It seems today, we are a hard-pressed people who are rushing from one task to another! Are we ever solitary, still, free or are we always busy with something that just can't wait? Is it difficult to find a space where God can allow "something new" to really take place?

Maybe that "something new" could be a Wednesday evening devotional time that Pastor

Joe and Pastor Matthew will "kick off" on Wednesday, October 2, at 6:30 p.m. in the First Lutheran Church library. This time slot will follow the regular Oasis family meal (5 to 6 p.m.) and the 6 p.m. worship service. This opportunity will continue every Wednesday evening following the same schedule as the Wednesday school and confirmation classes. The session leader will consist of Pastor Joe or Pastor Matthew or lay leader from the First Lutheran faith community.

Following the recommendation of our pastors, this Henri Nouwen book, *You Are the Beloved*, will be used during the sessions and by the participant during the week. The book consists of 365 daily devotions that typically include less than a page of content that will stimulate self-thinking and processing. Participants will be encouraged to acquire the book . . . there will be a dozen books available at the Wednesday, October 2, session on a first come – first served basis with no cost to the participant.



There are approximately seven million Nouwen books in print, and they all offer deep spiritual insight into human experiences, intimacy, brokenness, and compassion. *New York Times* bestselling author Brene' Brown says that "Henri Nouwen's timeless and loving words are quiet prayers that will forever live in my heart."

It has been shared that the daily devotions in this book "empower readers to claim their central identity as the "beloved" of God and live out that truth in their daily lives". Let's give it a try and join us on Wednesday evenings with "kick off" on Wednesday, October 2.

CHILDREN'S CHRISTMAS STORE

Where children pick out and wrap gifts to give family members at Christmas

A Little History: Back in 2008, the Children's Ministry of First Lutheran had the great idea to host a Children's Christmas Store; and after two years of hosting, they realized that, with everything else December had going on, it was more than they were able to take on! However, the response from those two years was overwhelming, so in 2011, I reopened the Store as an independent ministry.

On a Thursday evening (which was expanded to include Friday) the classrooms were full of gifts, the rec room full of wrapping notions and the dining room was FULL of families, children and Christmas Joy! As children arrived, they got a number and as a Shopper Helper was available, the next number in the que was called, and so the evening went... a hundred excited, hungry children after school, eating Christmas Cookies... imagine! Piecemakers

Many hands and many different processes go into making a quilt. To begin, fabric squares are cut into specific sizes. Currently, there are two ways in which the squares are cut. Method 1 uses plexiglass templates. The quilter chooses fabric, draws around the template and then cuts on the line with scissors. A second method is to use a ruler, rotary cutter (a rolling razor blade) and a self-healing cutting mat on which to cut the fabric.
