We recently practiced Lectio Divina as the sermon on a Sunday a few weeks ago. If you haven't heard of this practice, just do a quick Google search and read about it. There was good feedback, and as a leader, it was tremendously life giving. It is amazing how the church, in general, feeds off of society and its norms for overscheduling and constant 'production' and busyness. This practice, at least for me, reminded me that the church is counter-cultural. In this instance, countercultural meant we slowed down, we embraced silence, and we sat with the Living Word, with Scripture. Too often we believe being church, being community means we must be busier, have more events, do more. But God tells us we are loved as we are. There is no need to prove anything, to be a certain level of productive, to be loved fully by God. What Good News that is and I was thankful for the practice of Lectio Divina to remind me and us all of that Good News.

#### Dream Big update

I am excited to announce that our Master Planning Committee met with Vanman staff on September 16<sup>th</sup> to share feedback from the Dream Big envisioning exercises. Over the next few months, the Vanman architect and design consultant will be working with the committee on an interactive process to develop a vision to enhance First Lutheran Church facilities, one that helps better support our ministries and mission. Key areas highlighted were:

- **Education Wing**: Creating a dedicated space for our growing youth programs, ensuring a safe, functional, and inviting environment.
- Community Spaces: Upgrades to our entries, kitchen, dining hall, meeting rooms, and gathering areas to facilitate improved functionality for programs, education, and community building, and events.
- Accessibility Improvements: Ensuring our facilities are welcoming and accessible to all members of our community.

While the committee was selected to represent the many programs and ministries of the church, we will be doing targeted outreach throughout this process to assure the draft designs represent the vision and needs of the congregation. Although we likely won't be able to finance our entire dream for FLC facilities, together we will be able to create a space that better supports our strategic goals.

Look for updates on the progress of this exciting work in the months ahead. I will close my article with the opening prayer for our committee meetings, 'Lord, as we embark on this exciting journey of renovating our church, we thank You for the vision that has brought us together and pray that You guide our decisions and keep our focus on serving You and our community. In Jesus' name we pray, Amen.' I invite you to also pray for the Lord's guidance in this process.

# Stewardship Team Update

#### Giving is Good for Us

Even though we are months away from the "season of giving", we can give in big and small ways to make positive impacts on our family, church, community, and ourselves. In a recent article by authors Jason Marsh and Jill Suttie in Greater Good Magazine there are five major ways that giving is good for us.

- 1. Giving makes us feel happy. A Harvard Business School study in 2008 concluded that giving money to someone else, rather than spending it on ourselves, lifted the giver's happiness level. A study in 2006 by the National Institutes of Health found that when people give to charities, it activates regions of the brain associated with pleasure, social connection, and trust.
- **2. Giving is good for our health.** According to author Stephen Post, a professor of preventative medicine at Stony Brook University, giving to others provides health benefits to people with chronic illness, including HIV and multiple sclerosis. Other research suggests that giving improves physical health and longevity by reducing stress.
- **3.** Giving promotes cooperation and social connection. Several studies point out that giving promotes a sense of trust and cooperation that strengthens our ties to others and has a positive effect on mental and physical health. Giving to a common cause helps develop a sense of belonging and connection.
- **4. Giving evokes gratitude.** Giving or receiving gifts brings feelings of gratitude. Barbara Fredrickson, a pioneering happiness researcher, says that cultivating gratitude in everyday life is one of the keys to increasing personal happiness. Other studies discover that college students who "count their blessings" exercise more, are more optimistic, and feel better about their lives overall.
- **5. Giving is contagious.** Giving creates a ripple effect of generosity. Generous people inspire others to behave generously. If one person inspires two people to be generous, and those two cause four more to act generously, the gifts have a multiple effect in an entire community. The impact of a generous gift can go far beyond the initial action.

Giving allows us to grow and develop and, if we believe the research, giving has a positive impact on our health and wellness. Ultimately, giving is one more way for us to develop our relationship to others and to God.

Jesus was teaching on the plain when he said, "Give, and it will be given to you. A good measure, pressed down, shaken together and running over, will be poured into your lap. For with the measure you use, it will be measured to you." (Luke 6:38)



Barndt attempts to show how changes have brought about both progress and regression in the struggle to end racism. Pastor Hammerling encourages but is not requiring the reading of the book prior to the October 27 and November 3 sessions.

### **Every Buddy**

But love your enemies and do good ... and you will be sons (and daughters) of the Most High; for He Himself is kind to ungrateful men. Be merciful just as your Father is merciful.

The tables turned when she asked us not to talk to her while she was fixated on the paper in front of her. Our gregarious, chatty 6-year-old was typically the one asked to "shush". Her music teacher counseled them not to make any mistakes on the main song in their kindergarten graduation program, and Oaklyn was resolute in her determination to know every word perfectly. She wrote the words from memory so she could practice – "This is it. Perfect fit. Everybody is united," was how it was supposed to start. But Oaklyn had spelled Everybody "Every buddy".


I explained the difference between the terms, but she insisted every buddy was correct because all the kids in her class were her buddies. Only one "Bestie" but they were all her buddies, no mention of enemies. About a month later she pointed out a boy from her class in the grocery store, told me his name, and gave him and his sister big hugs. Then she told me there was another boy with the same name in her class. When our paths crossed the second boy's one day, Oaklyn pulled back, partially obscuring herself from his view, stating "He's not nice to me."


We remind our kids that "a gentle answer turns away wrath, but a harsh word stirs up anger," hoping their actions will be reciprocated, but knowing that won't always be the case. Just as Jesus told the disciples, if they aren't received well they are to "go out of that house or city, shake the dust off your feet." Jacob heaped rocks up to denote a "safe" boundary between his people and Laban's, so they could all dwell in peace. We try as hard as we can, for as long as we can, to shield our kids from some of the harshness on earth.

Last night, I caught sight of a small deer enjoying the buffet at the edge of my back yard. I knocked on the window, but the deer barely acknowledged the startling noise. I raised the window and yelled through the screen warranting a slight response from the deer. Going outside, I found it fearlessly inspecting the window I had just occupied, and it finally took off. Its curiosity had been stronger than any concern for safety, but my proximity finally propelled him in a different direction.

Ephesians tells us "Be kind to one another, tender-hearted, forgiving each other just as God in Christ has forgiven you." We try to go forward being kind, tender-hearted, cautious, curious, forgiving, grateful, observant of boundaries, and most of all – loving. With God's help, may these be examples to help guide our children as well.

### CHILDREN'S CHRISTMAS STORE

### Save the date... Saturday, December 7th!

During the Christmas season, there are families in our community for whom gift giving is a luxury they cannot easily afford. Parents may be able to provide a gift for their children, but also buying gifts for their children to *give* really adds up! Here is how we get to bless them! The Children's Christmas Store provides children in these families the opportunity to 'shop' for family members at a price they *can* afford! Through the generality of others, these children get to experience the joy of giving to their parents, siblings and grandparents.

All gifts for sale at the Christmas Store are provided by donations. Whether you are the joy of the child that gets to buy it and give it.

All gifts are priced and sold for \$1.00. Imagine a family with 3 children.

If each child bought a \$10 gift just for Mom, Dad and each of their siblings, it would cost \$120. Shopping at the Children's Christmas Store, each child can pick out their own gift to give each of their siblings and each of their parents for a cost to the family of only \$12 dollars! Each child can even add two Grandmas & Grandpas for only \$4 more!



#### **FAQ'S**

Who is invited? All children are welcomed! We will send an informational poster to organizations in our community that can best identify and invite families who would be the most blessed by this ministry, but we can't advertise to the community at large, simply because we cannot accommodate that number of shoppers. Children of our church family and friends are encouraged to participate for the fun of it. Our mission is to 'nurture the joy of giving' in our young people! Additionally, if you know of a family that would benefit from the Children's Christmas Store, please tell them about it and invite them to sign up!

How does the sign-up work? Parents can call the church office or go online to our website to sign children up for a shopping time. There are 10, one hour time slots each half hour from 10:00a.m. to 3:30p.m. for a total of 120 openings. (More can be added if needed.)

**Is there an age limit?** We do need children be at least 4 years of age. Younger children are typically not able to go with a 'shopper helper' they are unfamiliar with and can't always understand that they are shopping for other people! All these gifts are so appealing and fun to play with ;)

How many children usually shop at the Christmas Store? An average of 100 children; buying over 900 gifts!

How can I help? This ministry relies entirely on volunteers to run the store and donations to create it!

How can I volunteer? There will be sign-up sheets for setting up, shopper helpers, wrapping helpers, greeters, schedule coordinators and clean up crew! (When we're done, the church has to be ready for Sunday worship!)

What types of gifts are needed? Any item, new or gently used, that a child could give as a gift to a family member. No clothing, since a child would not likely know what size to get. Socks, hats, gloves and that sort of *generally* sized items are fine. The store is always, particularly, in need of gifts for teens and

What kinds of supplies are needed? small and medium gift bags and tissue paper (colored tissue is extra fun), boxes to wrap their gifts in, bows, tape, (we have wrapping paper), batteries and money for random supplies.

When and where can I donate gift items? The church office any time, we accept & store gifts all year.

What is done with the money children spend at the Christmas Store? The majority of funds from 'gift sales' are returned to the community to help families in need through agencies such as the Crisis Center, Becker County Food Pantry, Boys & Girls Club and Agape Ministry of First Lutheran. Ten percent is given to First Lutheran to cover the cost of resources used to host the Christmas Store. A portion is also allocated to the FLC youth account, relative to youth who help out at the store.
